

Prosperity Despite Redistribution

- The myth: social democracy explains Nordic success on most criteria
- The facts: Nordic countries have strong liberal (in the old sense) traditions, pursue free trade, uphold rule of law and protect property
- Moreover, they have a high level of trust, social cohesion because of homogeneity, transparency, and tradition of hard work, independence, and self-reliance




Eidsvoll 17 May 1814 when the Norwegians adopted a very liberal constitution





Three Icelandic Innovations

- Icelandic Commonwealth 930–1262: restitution, crimes compensated; private enforcement of law; choice between 'protective agencies' or chieftains
- Quota system in fisheries since 1975 (comprehensive since 1991): fishing firms hold permanent, transferable rights to harvest a given amount of total allowable catch, creating an incentive to minimise cost
- Depositors' claims given priority in 2008; removes need for government guarantees of banks
