Hayek's Significance Today

- Hayek's riddle: How can we explain the enormous achievements of Western civilisation despite individual ignorance?
- His solution: We utilise knowledge that we do not possess, both skills (knowledge how) and information (knowledge that)
- In a free society, coordination without commands is possible: Division of knowledge
- This applies to economists and epidemiologists alike: epidemiologists know little about the economy; and economists know little about epidemics
- Epidemiologists cannot take over; nor can engineers, climatologists or other specialists: their narrow knowledge has to be widened out

The Nightwatchman State: Prevent Injustice

- Protect us against forces of the dark: Intruders and Invaders
- Police, Military Forces, Justice System
- Any further duties? Possibly, as a matter of expediency, not justice, for example education and poverty relief
- Otherwise, peace and property might be endangered
- Preventive measures



State: March of Devil, not God, in History

- Hegel wrong, State not march of God in History
- Aggression, theft, cruelty, misdeeds, callousness
- Nietzsche: State is a cold monster
- Public choice, on a lower note: State not likely to produce intended results
- Lack of information
- Lack of incentives
- Therefore: Mistrust of State



Injustice and Misfortune

- State should prevent injustice, protect us against intruders and invaders
- But it cannot prevent individual misfortune: some are born less healthy or less intelligent than others; some receive care and encouragement and others not; some are lucky and others not
- Of course, then some are lazy, negligent, profligate, promiscuous, etc.
 They should bear the costs of their vices and mistakes themselves, not others
- Those more lucky cannot be expected to bear the costs of other people's misfortune; it is not their fault; it is nobody's fault

Collective misfortune

- Despite all its faults, the State is an expression of collective solidarity and the guardian of shared identity
- Collective misfortunes such as earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, avalanches of mud or snow, tsunamis, and epidemics are (usually) nobody's fault
- They potentially hit all; they are like an invasion
- Suddenly we are as if in a city under siege; or in a lifeboat
- Therefore the State should try to minimise and mitigate their impact
- Fortunately, easier with epidemics than natural disasters
- Justifiable to limit the freedom of people to infect others

Tax Collection for Rescue Justified

- Aquinas and Hume both firm proponents of private property rights
- Aquinas: In city under siege justifiable to seize property of others to save the city and its inhabitants (Summa, Bk. II, Pt. II, Qu. 66, §7
- Hume concurred (Enquiry, Sect. III, Pt. I)
- My interpretation: Justifiable to use taxpayers' money, if collective disaster, natural or social



Our Selective Mind

- Attention on the extraordinary: If dog bites man not newsworthy; if man bites dog newsworthy
- 6 May 2020: 3.6 million infected from Covid-19, 248,000 deaths
- Tuberculosis: 1.5 million dead per year, 10 million infected annually
- HIV/Aids: 770,000 dead per year, 1.7 million infected annually
- Malaria: 405,000 dead per year, 228 million cases
- Hepatitis C: 399,000 dead per year, 71 million cases
- Black Death in 1347–51 killed half the world's population
- Spanish Flu in 1981–19 killed around 50 million

The Politicisation of Malaria

- Malaria caused by mosquitos
- DDT an efficient and cheap insecticide
- Was probably over-used in agriculture, but harmless for humans
- Banned under influence of Rachel Carson's Silent Spring (1962)
- Malaria had almost disappeared as a result of DDT; it reappeared
- Has cost millions of lives, not least African children



Is the Covid-19 Nobody's Fault?

- If China had immediately reacted and closed her borders, there would have been no pandemic
- Chinese communist leaders have not answered pertinent questions:
- 1. Why did they ignore persistent warnings against bat-borne infections?
- 2. What was going on in Wuhan leading to the epidemic?
- 3. Why did they try to suppress all information about the epidemic? Where are critics who have disappeared?
- 4. Why is the guy spreading false allegations still public spokesman?
- 5. Why are the statistics from China obviously wrong?

Government Failure

- Behaviour of Chinese communists illustrates case against State: suppression of danger signals, slow reaction
- Reaction in West also illustrates case against State: regulatory agencies delay tests of drugs
- It is private enterprise that is producing test equipment, ventilators, etc.
- However, during a siege there is always a strengthening of collective solidarity and a temporary sympathy for the state
- The 'moral equivalent of war'
- But what is appropriate in a lifeboat is not appropriate on a ship sailing freely in the seven seas

Socialism has been tried ...


- ... and found wanting, in the last two months
- What we have experienced in the West is life like it was under socialism, a society of empty streets
- Everybody stayed at home
- There were no restaurants open
- Shops only with bare necessities
- Dictatorship, not of the proletariat, but of (well-meaning) epidemiologists

The Icelandic Model

- Probably an over-reaction around the world
- Economic growth is the most effective doctor of mankind
- More lives possibly lost as a result of a sharp global recession than because of the pandemic, especially in Less Developed Countries, cf. the figures on Malaria, Tuberculosis and hepatitis C
- Icelandic reaction sensible and moderate: Close universities, restaurants, cancel mass meetings, concerts, ban meetings of more than 20, but keep shops, most schools, factories and businesses open
- Test as many as possible and provide enough ventilators and masks
- Isolate the problem instead of imposing it on everyone

Challenges

- Government blunders turned a Chinese epidemic into a global pandemic
- We cannot be dependent on China for medicine and equipment
- Government over-regulation has delayed responses to the pandemic
- While government outlays to minimise and mitigate the disaster are justified, they have to be focused and reasonable
- Economic growth, tax cuts and deregulation, is the only way out of the Depression
- You don't solve problems by throwing money at them
- Two months of socialism teaches us a lesson: Let us enjoy life! Breathe freely! Let us get out of the lifeboat; let us lift the siege
- A country should not be a fortress or a prison; it should be a home
